Registration:

Registration (pre and on-site) is located on the 4th Floor Pre-Function area outside of Ballroom D.

Name Badge Required

A TASSP Summer Workshop name badge must be worn at all times for the security and convenience of all attendees. Name badges are required to gain admission to the Exhibit Showcase, meeting rooms, and other guest services.

Recording CPE Hours

Educators are required to keep a record of their professional development hours to meet the number of required hours for certification. The Texas Association of Secondary School Principals approved provider number is 500-111. TASSP does <u>not</u> keep a copy of attendance by session at TASSP-sponsored workshops and conferences. 3rd General Session Keynote: KEVIN CARROLL

Play@Work: Unleashing Growth through Creativity and Innovation

Kevin Carroll is the founder of Kevin Carroll Katalyst/LLC. He sees his "job" as an encourager to others to embrace their spirit of play and creativity to maximize their human potential and sustain more meaningful business and personal growth. Raised by his grandparents in Philadelphia, Kevin spent endless hours at the neighborhood playground where he found his calling: a red rubber ball. His subsequent pursuit of play and his 'red rubber ball' took him overseas with the Air Force, where he served as a language interpreter and translator,

gaining fluency in Croatian, Czech, Serbian, and German. After serving for ten years and earning his college degree, Kevin became an athletic trainer at the high school and collegiate levels in Philadelphia which led to his job as the Head Athletic Trainer for the Philadelphia 76ers in 1995. While at the 76ers, Nike nabbed Kevin to add value to the overall mission of the brand. Kevin accepted the challenge and stayed for seven years before creating his own company. In May of 2005, a notable moment occurred when Kevin addressed dignitaries from 31 nations at the United Nations about the importance of play in their developing countries.

Jimmy Casas' core purpose is in serving others. As a speaker in his local community, as well as around the country, Jimmy was invited to the White House to speak on the Future Ready Schools pledge. Jimmy is the co-founder of EdCampIowa and of #IAedchat, a popular on-line chat. Jimmy is the author and co-author of several books, including What Connected Educators Do Differently and Start. Right Now. Teach and Lead for Excellence. Jimmy also serves on the NASSP Professional

Development Faculty. He has 22 years of school leadership experience at the secondary level, is an adjunct professor at Drake University, the 2012 Iowa Secondary Principal of the Year, a finalist for the 2013 NASSP National Principal of the Year, and the 2015 Bammy National Principal of the Year.

In his book, *Culturize*, Jimmy shares insights into what it takes to cultivate a community of learners who embody the innately human traits our world desperately needs, such as kindness, honesty, and compassion. His stories reveal how these "soft skills" can be honed while meeting and exceeding academic standards for twenty-first-century learning.

However, when confronted with repetitive behaviors intended to harm, many adolescents do not have the skill set to combat bullying behaviors. In order to lessen the impact of bullying behaviors in public programs, interventions must target both the victims and the bullies. Youth who are targets of bullying should be taught the appropriate responses to bullying behavior. Youth who are labeled as bullies should be taught to use his/her natural leadership ability for pro-social change in schools and the elevation of peers. 

Clear Lake High School, faced with rapidly changing demographics and anticipating several years of reconstruction, confronted a unique lunchtime challenge: how can a campus feed 2500 students in half an hour with a single cafeteria located half a mile away from most of the student body. The solution - "Falcon Lunch" - revolutionized lunch service, turning this logistical impossibility into an innovative, paradigm-shifting program, one that not only ensures that all students are fed but also improves base-line campus culture and provides academic support for the students who most need it: those who work after school, ride the bus, take care of siblings, or are involved in after-school activities. We will discuss methods that we employed as we initiated and maintained a one-hour lunch period, including procedural issues related to implementation and a tailored campus-fit, building consensus with community stakeholders, designing adequate duty coverage, and successfully introducing the concept to students. We will also discuss the various challenges, both expected and unexpected, that we encountered and overcame with regard to the provision of meaningful academic intervention; teacher-led tutorials; SAT, ACT, STAAR, and AP test prep; peer tutoring; and time to complete homework. 

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

STANDARD CERTIFICATE RENEWAL REQUIREMENTS

<u>OVERVIEW</u>: All educators should model the philosophy of life-long learning and participate in professional development activities that focus on the need to continually update knowledge in content, best practice, research, and technology that is relevant to the individual's role as an educator. Each individual who holds a Standard Certificate is responsible for renewing the certificate. The rules adopted by the Board for renewing certificates are codified at Title 19, Part VII, Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 232, Subchapter A, and are available through the Texas Education Agency (TEA) web site tea.texas.gov.

<u>STANDARD CERTIFICATE RENEWAL CYCLE</u>: The renewal cycle will be every five years at the end of the educator's birth month. For example, an educator born in March issued a certificate in December 1999 would be subject to renewal requirements on March 31, 2005. Educators holding lifetime certificates are exempt from the renewal process. However, current educators adding Standard Certificates must renew the certificate.

STANDARD CERTIFICATE RENEWAL REQUIREMENTS: All certified educators seeking to renew a certificate must:

- complete the appropriate continuing professional education clock hours;
- complete the online standard renewal application;
- pay the appropriate renewal fee;
- successfully complete a criminal history review; and
- not be in default on a student loan or in arrears of child support

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION (CPE) REQUIREMENTS: CPE requirements for each class of certificate are as follows:

- classroom teachers must complete 150 clock hours every five years;
- school counselors, learning resource specialists/librarians, educational diagnosticians, reading specialists, master teachers, superintendents, principals, and assistant principals must complete 200 clock hours every five years; and
- dyslexia CPE training is required for educators who teach students with dyslexia and must include new research and practices in educating students with dyslexia

An educator must complete a total of 150 or 200 clock hours of continuing professional education every five years. A classroom teacher who also holds a principal certificate would need a total of 200 clock hours to renew both the teacher and principal certificates.

Please note that educational aides are not required at this time to complete any CPE hours for certificate renewal.

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION ACTIVITIES: CPE clock hours can be accrued through the following:

- workshops, conferences, and in-service or staff development given by an approved registered provider;
- undergraduate and graduate coursework through an accredited institution of higher education, with one semester credit being equivalent to 15 CPE clock hours;
- interactive distance learning, video conferencing, or on-line activities;
- independent study, not to exceed 20% of the required clock hours, which may include: self-study of relevant professional materials (e.g., books, journals, periodicals, video and audio tapes, computer software, interactive distance learning, video conferencing, or online activities); developing curriculum; or authoring a published work;
- developing, teaching, or presenting CPE activities, not to exceed 10% of the required clock hours; and
- providing professional guidance as a mentor to another educator, not to exceed 30% of the required clock hours

Written documentation and verification of all CPE activities for Standard Certificate renewal must be maintained by the educator. Worksheets to assist educators in tracking their CPE clock hours can be found on the TEA website. <u>It is the</u> responsibility of the educator to determine which CPE activities meet the requirements for standard certificate renewal.

<u>CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION PROVIDERS</u>: All persons or organizations providing CPE activities to educators for Standard Certificate renewal must be registered with TEA. Providers must furnish each educator with written documentation to include:

- provider's name and ID number;
- educator's name;
- date and content of the activity completed; and
- number of clock hours awarded

Only those CPE activities from TEA registered providers will be recognized for Standard Certificate renewal purposes. All CPE providers approved by TEA are listed under the "Texas Educators", then "Certification Renewals" link on the TEA website.

Section A - Instructions

Written documentation and verification of completed activities applied toward CPE requirements are required. Educators are responsible for maintaining a record of their CPE credits. The tracking worksheet is provided for personal use and does not have to be submitted to TEA. It is the responsibility of the educator and the school district to determine which workshops or training sessions meet the requirements for standard certificate renewal. TEA staff will not make these determinations. This allows maximum flexibility for educators to identify appropriate CPE activities to meet their individual needs. TEA is not requiring educators to submit written evidence of completed CPE hours, but rather keep that information available in a personal file in the event your certification records are chosen for an audit.
